New year, new blessings

For the second month in a row, it is again my pleasure to inform the congregation of a major gift to First Lutheran. A cadre of families and individuals have made possible the purchase of a grand piano.

It has long been a goal to have a piano that enhances the quality of the musical experience already acclaimed with our two organs.

The council and the congregation render a heartfelt thank-you to John Allured, Phyllis Chrisman and Dori Shimer, Nick Larsen, George and Ingrid Yule, Jim Puls, Don and Jill Knuth, and Allen and Julia Simon for this generous gift.

The council and Property Task Force continue to struggle with the congregational vote for the task force to identify and purchase a parsonage.

Although the vote was to pursue a property with a purchase price of up to \$1 million, without the ability to obtain a

mortgage, the purchase will be limited to the cash available in the pastoral housing fund.

There have been healthy discussions whether an 'appropriate' property can be found in this price range that will meet the needs of our future pastor; the other side of the debate favors waiting for a more stable economy and/or the future pastor to help define 'appropriate'.

However, in respect for the congregation's vote, the council has directed the task force to continue to identify properties within our price range.

Our new youth director Jeremy Serrano will be the guest at Adult Forum on October 2nd. Based upon the discussion he led at Men's Breakfast recently, I encourage you all to come learn about his fascinating faith journey.

Properties update

Through much of the summer, the New Property Task Force has been working to "prequalify" ourselves for mortgage opportunities as we embarked on the search for a parsonage.

Unfortunately, due to the meltdown in the housing industry, the rules for lending have been rewritten and we do not qualify for a loan.

We've checked with lending institutions, mortgage brokers and Thrivent (requires an interest earning account in a significant sum) and all have turned us down.

I reported our findings to Council and our Task Force has been directed to continue the search for a parsonage but within the "housing fund" amount which stands at approximately \$500,000.

So, we will engage our resident (pun intended) real estate broker, John King, to begin providing listings of homes in this price range.

As reported during the Annual Meeting in June, the Task Force will report to the Executive Committee our recommendations and we will keep the Congregation informed of our progress.

We continue to meet and evaluate our progress on the Parish Hall studies for renovation.

Recently, we have elected to pull together all of our findings – committee interviews, pricing structures, options for rebuilding, financing, etc. – and conduct an afternoon "charrette" in the next month to attempt to provide a linear approach to the evaluation of the options and how best to move to a recommendation of next steps.

Through all of you, we have tremendous feedback and we look forward to applying all we know into a condensed summary that we can present in the very near future.

Sierra Pacific Synod District D Assembly

To what do we compare this generation?

Each fall the three Conferences that make up District D—Peninsula, Santa Clara Valley, and Monterey Bay—gather for worship, learning, and fellowship as well as addressing any synodical, churchwide or area concerns.

This year's theme is taken from the hard question Jesus raises in Matthew 11:16 as he begins his public ministry: "To what do we compare this generation?"

In the June issue of *The Lutheran*, in the article "Ten Trends To Watch", one trend in today's culture is people being more spiritual and less religious.

What might that mean for ministry in my congregation's locale?

The speaker is Dr. Carol Jacobson from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. She is Associate Professor of Practical Theology: Youth and Family Ministries and Director, Life Together: Theological Programs for High School Youth.

Carol states on her faculty page: "The challenges facing Christian education in our church today are the same as they have always been: namely to equip and to empower the whole people of God, both lay and ordained, to embrace the Gospel life by deepening their relationship with God and by offering their lives in service to the world in which they live."

District Assembly

Dr. Jacobson will address the issue of "spiritual but not religious" and what it takes to reach the younger generations.

The assembly is for any leader in the congregation who may find insights for ministry. Small breakout focus groups will feature, Council Presidents, Social Ministry, Worship, and Youth.

Music

You may have noticed a shiny new addition to the sanctuary at FLC—a beautiful Yamaha grand piano. Yes, FLC has acquired, through the generosity of a number of donors, a Yamaha C3 (Conservatory Series) grand piano. The piano is 6'1" in length, about 20 years old, and is in great condition.

Interestingly, the piano was bought in a "going-out-of business" sale for Fresno Pianos, which took place at Peninsula Yamaha in San Jose, one of only a handful of Yamaha dealers in the Bay Area. I drove down and played about 20 pianos, from a selection of over 200 in all sizes and prices, and decided on a couple of pianos suitable for FLC. I recommended the choices to Allen who speedily went to San Jose to try the pianos. We both agreed on the C3 that is now in the sanctuary.

The new piano will enhance the already wonderful music program at FLC. It will add an element of versatility as it can be used to accompany the choir in a broad

range of anthems, especially gospel music, spirituals, and contemporary music, as well as being used for preludes, postludes, and other instrumental or vocal music. I'm sure the piano will attract groups for the 4@1st concert series, and perhaps the upcoming concert season will feature a piano soloist or the piano featured with any combination of instrument or vocalist.

The Yamaha Company was founded in 1887 by Torakusu Yamaha in Hamamatsu, Japan, and Yamaha pianos are considered worldwide to be exceedingly well-made instruments of superior quality.

First Lutheran's new piano will last for many, many years to come and will be bring pleasure and joy to all those that hear it. It is a wonderful new addition to the church and to the music ministry of FLC. Many thanks again to the generous donors who made this possible!



Letter from Rios de Agua Viva

What follows is an English translation of a recent letter from Pastor Vilma Rodriguez of our sister parish in San Salvador, El Salvador, Rios de Agua Viva.

Thanks for having us always present in your prayers.

The family of Diana and Anita have almost finalized their preparations for their visas and this week we are going to make appointments for the interview through the call center in Mexico. When we have the date of interview we are going to write to you.

Your prayers today more than ever are necessary for us, because many of the families of Rivers are experiencing very difficult situations.

Mrs Elodia Rivas, one of our oldest parishioners, is seriously ill, has some disks of the backbone dislocated and has difficulties moving.

We are praying for her and waiting for all of her medical processing, but they don't give much hope for her.

Rebeca Cornejo, who is relatively new in the Church, began to participate of the devotional life in January of this year, but Sunday told us that her mom is dying little by little by renal deficiency.

Her mom's kidneys do not function and she is already, as an older person, resistant to dialysis because it is very painful and she does not see results of healing.

Besides, the possibility of transplant of a kidney is almost impossible, because it is a very expensive surgical operation and because to date they have not found compatible donors.

Flor Chávez and Angela de Cornejo, two parishioners of Rios, have remained without work during the current economic crisis and to this day they have not found new jobs.

The economic situation is very difficult and above all the social violence that has increased a lot; as usual, the most affected are the most vulnerable sector of the population: women, the elderly, and children.

If I am feeling a little pessimistic or depressed, the other reason is that today I went to give a training to the lay leaders of the 15 churches of the Microcomputer region north of San Salvador.

I was informed that the husband of Mirna Dueñas, one of the leaders of the Church of the Holy Trinity, was murdered last week by some robbers who boarded the bus he was riding. They began to rob him and the passengers and the driver.

Mr. Dueñas resisted the robbery and one of the thieves shot him in the back and killed him. Mirna arrived today to the training and served us the snacks as usual, but was with the very sad look and was making a large effort not to cry.

I had to be with her to give her the emotional support and to help to process her sorrow, but there were 35 students who needed our attention, so only when we were alone I could embrace her and to tell her that I would go with her to attend psychological counseling next Monday at the synod offices.

She lives in a city that is two hours away from San Salvador and it is very difficult to come during the week to the Synod for the consultation.

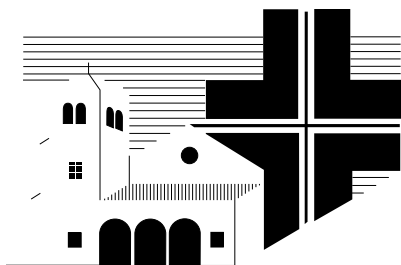
